1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The IQAC of the college brings together periodic feedback from its stakeholders to maintain quality standards in achieving the mission. Feedback is examined at departmental or committee level and reports are used for further action. A planned course wise feedback is collected from students regarding curriculum, faculty performance, teaching methodologies and also concerning improvements in the departments. The Placement Cell of the College collects periodic feedback from prominent employers who recruit students for Internships and Campus Placements. Feedback on curriculum enrichment and restructuring was sought from external experts of Board of Studies during the BOS meetings. Prominent Alumni are also members of the Board of Studies of Departments and give suggestions on improvements in the curriculum, possibility of popular jobs and necessary skills. The departments conduct regular Parents - Teachers Meeting to review the performance of the students in academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and to give the feedback regarding the progress of their wards. The suggestion received through students, to enrich the curriculum delivery, various certificate and short term courses based on skill acquisition, recent trends, socially relevant concepts, employability oriented modules and capability enhancement modules were incorporated in UG and PG programme. Seminars, workshops, guest lectures, Poster exhibitions and science day celebrations were organized to enrich learning experience and perform to their maximum potential. The Teacher's feedback regarding the curriculum was analyzed at departmental level and to make the study more practical and reduce the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical application, some additional practical exercises, Field /Industrial visits were arranged by the departments. Departmental almanac regarding academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activity plans along with detailed teaching plans of individual faculty members was collected and some interdisciplinary activities were suggested for academic and personality development of the students. The syllabus for PG programme was revised for highlighting the employability, entrepreneurship and skill development in the courses as per the observations received by parents. The slow learners were taken into attention for activity-based learning combined with practical syllabi and internal assessment scheme after faculty remarks. The suggestion and recommendations were seriously considered by the institution when the Central Board of Studies stipulated changes in the syllabi from 2019-20 onwards for UG programme. A major revision in UG curriculum during the session was approved by college BOS for Part I courses. The revision was mainly in view of the subtraction of repeated chapters and introduction of relevantly useful topics according to the standards of students and need of hour. Elective courses were introduced by some departments as per the feedback received by alumni and further some value-added courses were also initiated for advanced learners. Feedback from Parents are obtained personally during parents meet and planned questionnaire, which is compiled and analysed at departmental level and necessary suggestions regarding course and curriculum are deliberated.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Yes. Student centric mentoring system is available in the college which is named as Tutor ward System. This scheme is implemented in both UG and PG classes. Under this scheme, A tutor is allotted with a group of approximately 50 students. The main work of tutor is to look after academic and psychological well being of the allotted students. He also monitor class attendance and performance during the academic year. In the classes where there are huge number of students, more than one mentor is assigned for the purpose. Mentors meet their mentees in the beginning of each academic session during induction programme. Two or three more meetings are scheduled later as per the need and academic calendar of the college. The mentor keeps the records of the mentee in the form of notices issued, advice and motivation provided and problems discussed during the session. The mentors are also responsible to maintain the biographic records of students like their academic background and socioeconomic status along with record of students class attendance, performances and academic progress. This tutor/mentor ward system is working smoothly in the college.

Effective operation of academic and administrative process is a backbone of our college. Democratic process has been adopted to take any decision related to maintaining and utility physical, academic and sports facilities. Laboratory stock checking of all the recurring and non recurring equipments is done in all the departments regularly. Regular maintenance in all the laboratories and repair works are carried out. The departmental library is taken care of by the staff in charge in each department. In the department stock registers, accession register, stock issue register and condemned register are maintained. Internal stock audit is done by other department HoD or senior faculty members.

The maintenance and service of the computer problems are handled by the concerned lab technicians and system administrator. Computer systems are installed with power back up. Students are instructed to follow standard operating procedures strictly during the use of systems to avoid system failure due to improper usage. There is a separate building committee in the college which look after the matter related to construction work. PWD RES has been engaged to undertake construction and maintenance work as when required. For electrical maintenance work there are two electricians in the campus. For plumbing work one plumber have also been engaged. The Principal has appointed a Prof. in charge for the maintenance of the Green and Clean Environment of the campus. Three gardeners have been appointed for maintaining the greeneries of the campus. There are sweepers cum cleaners appointed for the regular cleaning of the campus. A separate sports committees is there in the college for the development of sports facilities and to encourage excellent sports persons in the college. A barrier is fixed at the main entrance with a guard. Fire extinguishers are fixed in labs and in each block of building including library for safety purpose. CCTV cameras are fixed in labs and in each passage of building for security purpose. Different committees are constituted and the professors-in-charge are appointed to look after the maintenance of RO water filter maintenance, senitezer machine, CCTV, Cycle stand, Canteen, parking zone, gas supply system etc. From time to time the website is updated and monitored by the website committee. The department of Botany maintains the botanical garden. The Garden committee ensures the greenery through out the campus. There is a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances.

Grievances/complaints are promptly attended and resolved by the college administration and Grievances Redressal cell. As for as academic matters are concerned, departmental board of studies are authorized for implementation of new curriculum and courses too. The syllabus and curriculum approved by various Board of studies of departments are further passed by academic council of the college finally Governing body approves the matter for concerned academic year. Autonomous cell is working in the college which is responsible for conduction of regular examinations and declaration of results.
